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










Cherrie Sciro is the Coordinator of Theatre and an Associate Professor for the School of the Performing Arts at Tech. Her Broadway and national credits include Production Coordinator of the Tony Award-winning productions Cats, Les Miserables, Phantom of the Opera, and Miss Saigon. She was also the Production Manager for the Olympic Games in Barcelona and Atlanta. Her most treasured directing experience here at Tech is the 1999 production of Six Women with Brain Death..., which was awarded a total of 21 awards throughout the state and region, including the Richard A. Weaver Best Production Award, a first for the University Theatre.



Mark D. Guinn is an Associate Professor of Design and Movement for Tech. Mark's scenic design credits include *Little Shop of Horrors* and the world premiere of *Shane*. His lighting design credits include *Blue Jacket*, the epic outdoor drama, and *The Flaming Idiots* Off-Broadway at the New Victory Theatre. Mark is a Certified Teacher with the Society of American Fight Directors.



Scott Gilbert is an Assistant Professor who teaches directing, acting and theatre history. He has directed many productions at Tech, including *Smoke* on the Mountain, The Greeks, Twelfth Night, Buried Child, Tartuffe, The Comedy of Errors, and The Hostage. Other recent directing credits have been at Foothill Theatre Company in California, the Lake Tahoe Shakespeare Festival, Greenbrier Valley Theatre, and Oregon State University. When called upon, Scott designs, (*Six Women with Brain Death, Leaf Men*) acts, (numerous Shakespeare roles, George in Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?) choreographs fights, or does whatever is required to make theatre happen - and his comedy narration stylings annually grace Tech's Opera Workshop.



Michael Rasbury is an Assistant Professor of Music Technology and Theatre at Tech. As an award-winning composer, Michael's music has been heard around the nation in theatrical productions and television. He has composed musical scores for some of the nation's largest outdoor dramas. His professional credits include the Humana Festival, New American Playwrights, Actor's Theatre of Louisville, and the New York Shakespeare Festival. He has worked with some of the most innovative playwrights of the 20th century, including Naomi Wallace, Jane Martin, and John Patrick Shanley.



Paulette Gilbert is the Costume Studio Supervisor and primary Costume Designer. Memorable Tech designs include A *Doll's House, Twelfth Night, The Leaf Men and the Brave Good Bugs, and Peter Pan.* Professionally, she has managed the costume shops and/or designed for The Young Abe Lincoln Amphitheatre in IN, The Greenbrier Valley Theatre in WV, New Stage Theatre in MS, Univ. of Memphis Dept. of Theatre and Dance, and The Foothill Theatre Company in CA. For the past three summers she has been the Costume Shop Manager for the Lake Tahoe Shakespeare Festival in NV. She is also an accomplished actor with numerous acting credits at all of the same theatres.



Dianne Maroney-Grigsby is our Staff Choreographer. She received her Bachelor of Arts from Grambling State University and her Master of Arts from Louisiana Tech University. Dianne has instructed dance students in America, Europe, Asia, and Africa for the Alvin Ailey Dance Company. She is also the choreographer for the Orchesis Dance Company. Ms. Maroney has been the featured dancer in Twin City Ballet Company. Her training is in Modern, Horton, Graham, Classical Ballet, Tap and Jazz techniques. She teaches Dance for Theatre.

From the Director...

I have always wanted to direct Pirandello's Six Characters in Search of an Author, ever since I read it as an eager young college student much like the actors in the production you are about to see. To have the opportunity, almost twenty years later, to actually do so is wonderful, and it has been particularly delightful to work with this Robert Brustein / American Repertory Theater adaptation of Pirandello's modern classic. This version highlights the very things that we do well here at Louisiana Tech, and that brings us full circle: what is most important about any play is what actually goes on on the stage, and the response of the people in the audience. And that is you!

Six Characters is an acknowledged modern masterpiece, and Pirandello won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1934. His plays dominate the repertory in Italy to this day, and are frequently performed around the world. One website asserts that Six Characters is the second most important play of the Twentieth Century (behind, I have to assume, Waiting for Godot) and while this may be going a little too far even for me, the play deserves its reputation. Not only is it a fascinating and enduring work of theatre, but it has been enormously influential, opening the doors for the plays of Beckett, Ionesco, and Genet, as well as for modern movies (The Orchid Thief) and even David Letterman's television show. Trust me.

Of course, no play is perfect, and for today's audience, a faithful translation of *Six Characters* can seem excessively full of discussion and explanation. In addition, Pirandello's plays were so bold, so ahead of their time, that much of what was innovative about them has been completely adopted and assimilated into the theatre, leaving Pirandello's work sort of historically stranded. Robert Brustein's adaptation, done in collaboration with his acting company, addresses these issues, and transforms some of the philosophical discussions of the original into tangible and intense dramatic action. He wanted to tailor his production to the actual company and stage of the A.R.T., and in his script graciously encourages other companies to do the same. We have seized this opportunity, and the play you will see is a combination of Brustein's flexible innovations, and the fresh perspective of the Louisiana Tech actors, designers, and crew. Importantly, the whole thing strives to maintain the original genius of Pirandello.

Luckily for us, besides being a philosopher and theatrical innovator, Pirandello was capable of constructing a story for his six fictional characters worthy of the best of Days of Our Lives. A separated husband and wife, their son who has never known his mother, and her three children by another man are thrown together. Their long-held feelings clash, and they find themselves enmeshed in a tawdry sex scandal, which they bring onto the stage of an unsuspecting theatre. The arrival of the tormented characters, who suffer from the uncompleted state of their horrifying story, interrupts the company's rehearsal of another play, thereby committing an unforgivable breach of theatre protocol. The questions that arise, about the responsibility of artists for their creations, about whether the stage can really represent the pain of mankind, and about truth vs. illusion, are fundamental to our existence.

We hope you enjoy our effort to examine these questions in the most entertaining way we can. The play is about art and fiction on the one hand, and the actors and playwrights who create them on the other. The necessary third party is the audience. Without you, none of it means anything.


