Director's Notes

Published in 1939, John Steinbeck's *The Grapes of Wrath* immediately sparked controversy, passion, derision, and acclaim. In the seventy years since its publication, the emotions surrounding the novel are still as charged as ever. Steinbeck's unflinching examination of the lives of migrant workers fleeing the dust bowl of the Midwest was drawn from a series of newspaper articles he had written in 1936 detailing the lives of those living in a migrant camp in Northern California. Steinbeck thought to turn the articles and accompanying photographs into a series for Life magazine, but ultimately felt that the story was too grand to be limited to the magazine serial form. Attacked for what was deemed, at the time, as sexual content and "leftist" viewpoints, Grapes wound up selling more copies than any contemporary novel except for *Gone With the Wind*.

In the mid-1980's, while working with the famed Steppenwolf Theatre in Chicago, Frank Galati began to revisit an idea he had begun toying with ten years earlier for adapting the novel for the stage. Galati noted that "at the center of [his] vision were the elements...offer[ing] both symbolic and architectural symmetry." The incorporation of the elements to such a degree provides the play with a sensory depth not often found in late-twentieth century plays. This depth, coupled with the enormity of scope of the story, the large cast, and the technical demands serve to make Grapes an incredibly challenging piece of theatre.

Steppenwolf first produced *Grapes of Wrath* in 1988. After productions in California and London, it premiered on Broadway in 1989, winning Tony Awards for Best Play and for Best Director (Galati himself). Since its publication in 1991, the play has been produced regularly around the world, challenging artists and audiences alike. Grapes, then, became the perfect vehicle for Louisiana Tech University's Theatre Department to participate in the "Triumph Over Tragedy" commemoration.

Initiated in conjunction with the "Big Read" (a National Endowment for the Arts-sponsored project encouraging people to read a classic piece of literature), the "Triumph Over Tragedy" event is a commemoration of the 80th anniversary of the beginning of the Great Depression. While productions of *The Grapes of Wrath* have always touched a chord in the collective consciousness and memory of American audiences, it is even more resonant in our society today. Ultimately, we hope that our production will follow George Bernard Shaw's dictum that theatre should be both entertaining and didactic.

In my time here at Louisiana Tech, I am confronted by the largest company we have had for a production. Typically with large productions, the potential for challenges and problems multiplies exponentially. It is a testament to the professionalism, dedication, and hard work of our students, staff, and faculty that this production has come together so smoothly. I am extremely proud of the work and efforts of our student artists on so difficult a project. Their efforts have been magnificent and the results are shining here tonight for you to see. Thank you for your support of the Louisiana Tech University Theatre. I hope you enjoy your time with us tonight and hope to see you again the rest of our season. Please enjoy the show!
