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

Director's Notes

The Merry Wives of Windsor was, most likely, written around 1597-98. The apocryphal story behind the writing of the play is that Queen Elizabeth saw *Henry IV, Part I* and so enjoyed the character of Falstaff that she commanded Shakespeare to write another play that featured the fat knight in love--and only gave him fourteen days to complete it. Although we cannot prove or disprove the theory, our excellent dramaturge on this production, Alice Allen, found studies indicating that more likely than the royal command for the play, Shakespeare wrote it at the commission of Lord Hunsdon, who was Queen Elizabeth's Lord Chamberlain, and the patron of Shakespeare's company.

Regardless of the impetus, *Merry Wives* is truly a one-of-a-kind play in the Shakespearean canon. Silly, almost farcical, in nature, the play is the only one that is "middle-class" in nature. Akin to the modern situation comedy on television, *Merry Wives* tells a story of "everyday" people. Unlike almost all other Shakespearean plays, it does not have distinct members of the upper reaches of society as main characters. In fact, the one character identified with the royal court, Fenton, is denounced for that association. Because of this middle class quality, *Merry Wives* is one of Shakespeare's most appealing and accessible plays. The language is sharp and witty, the situations are silly and fun, and the jokes are fast and furious. Filled with practical jokes and deceptions meant to turn the tables on Falstaff and embarrass him, the story of these merry wives is one sure to draw audiences of all ages.

We arrived at the production concept for our show as a distinct way to challenge our students by placing them in a mode of production with which most were completely unfamiliar. Although minimalistic in design, and stripped down in performance, this approach is very difficult to master for artists at the student level. By choosing to include audience participation (yes, you may just find yourself a part of the show!), we have added an extra dollop of difficulty. We have challenged the actors, designers, and technicians to work outside their comfort zone quite a bit with this production, and I am pleased (but unsurprised) to say that they have risen quite admirably to the challenge.

As is always the case, I am fortunate to work with artists as talented as we have in the Louisiana Tech University Department of Theatre. Thank you so much for your ongoing support of these budding Artists and the commitment you show to a strong culture of the Arts. We could not do any of it without you and your support. I hope that you enjoy your evening of theatre as much as we have enjoyed providing it for you. Again, thanks!




