

Director's Notes

This production is fittingly, back from the dead. It is a revival of the Department of Theatre's Fall Quarter Advanced Acting: Food Fight class. The Food Fight class rotates into the curriculum every other year and allows upperclassmen that have passed Society of American Fight Director's Skills Proficiency Test the opportunity to explore a specific genre of acting. It also is a competition between other schools to raise food for local food banks. This year's production was and is distinguished alumni Qui Nguyen's Living Dead in Denmark. The fall performance of Living Dead in Denmark raised over seven hundred and fifty pounds of nonperishable foodstuffs for the local food bank and set a record for the Food Fight class!

It has been a pleasure exploring this play, the fights, and movement challenges demanded of the script. What zombie style do you pursue; Haitian Voodoo zombies, philosophical zombies, traditional Hollywood zombies, new school Hollywood zombies? What of the leads and their movement and fighting styles? How do we do this with no budget? The results of these inquiries will tread the boards of Arthur W. Stone Theatre this very evening and feed on your brain. If you are worried, here are a few warning signs that should make it easier to distinguish a zombie threat:

1. Disheveled Persona Appearance

- Torn or severely wrinkled clothing.

- Muddy clothing.
- Unkempt hair.

- Dirty fingernails.

2. They may not respond when you communicate.


3. If they smell dead, chances are they probably were once.

6. Staggering movement, much like someone trying to walk after both of their legs have fallen asleep.



Stepping out of the theatre, Ms. Sciro served as the Production Manager for the 1999 Hard Rock Rockfest in Atlanta, GA, and the Stage Manager for the 2001 New Year's Eve in Times Square in New York City. Her International credits include the London, England productions of Les Miserables, Phantom of the Opera, Miss Saigon, Follies, and Sunset Boulevard. She also served as the Production Manger for the Olympic Games in Barcelona, Spain and Atlanta, GA.




